Grace and peace be with you. As we've entered this new month, a time of reflection is expected as we celebrate All Saints' Sunday on November 7 and remember those who have gone before us in these past 12 months.

The question that you may want to ask is what is a saint? In the most basic sense, a saint is YOU! If you are a follower of Jesus Christ. If you trust your salvation in Christ Alone, You are a saint. When the first Sunday in November comes around every year, this is the day that we observe All Saints' Sunday. The date is picked every year by the first Sunday after November 1st. The Christian festival of All Saints' Day comes from a conviction that there is a spiritual connection between those in Heaven and on Earth. During this service, we remember those saints who have passed in the previous twelve months.

The Corinthians were called to be saints, meaning to live the life of a sanctified one (saint, sanctified & holy have the same Greek root word), which means they are set apart or claimed by God. The community was to have a shared dependency as they, "call upon the name of our Lord Jesus Christ."

What other significant things happened near November 1? Martin Luther chose the eve of All Saints' Day, October 31, to post his Ninety-five Theses in Wittenberg because he wanted the crowds who would come to church on the following day to see them. This day is traditionally when Lutherans celebrate Reformation Sunday.

In American culture, October 31 is commonly celebrated as Halloween. A night many children in America walk around trick-or-treating and wearing their favorite costumes. How does this secular holiday relate to Christian culture in the church? But would it surprise you that this holiday too, Halloween, was started as a Holy Christian celebration. If you remember that November 1 is always celebrated as All Saints' Day, another name for this is All Hallows Day. Hallow in old English means, "holy" and "sacred". Halloween, simply means Hallows-eve or the night before all Saints' Day.

Come and see in the following pages what has happened before and what is planned for the upcoming weeks of ministry at FLC. Take note especially of the All Saints Article as well as many others.

CONFLICT RESOLUTION ANNOUNCEMENT

This was read during the announcements at the October 10, 2021 worship service. We wanted to make sure that this information was available to everyone.

- A few weeks ago, we had Pastor Perry Fruhling, who is the coordinator for pastoral ministry for LCMC, come out to address conflict within the church.
- He goes around the U.S., for LCMC, to train councils and staffs and help empower them to work through conflict resolution within their congregations.
- The goal of conflict resolution is to deal with conflict directly, utilizing Christian principles and by doing this we will be able to work better together.
- It is important to be open about conflict because conflict is NORMAL.
- When more than one human is involved - no matter where you are - conflict is going to happen, so we've learned this process for conflict resolution.
- It is important to realize that 100% of all congregations have conflict --- and the most important tool to address this is having a healthy process to help us to walk through conflict together.
- The focus is to become healthier and stronger as we address conflicts that arise. This allows us to grow together as brothers and sisters in Christ, with the same mission and goals in mind, loving one another as Christ loves us.

According to some sources, the idea for All Saints' Day goes back to the fourth century when the Greek Christians kept a festival on the first Sunday after Pentecost (in late May or early June) in honor of all martyrs and saints. Other sources say that a commemoration of "All Martyrs" began to be celebrated as early as 270 CE but no specific month or date is recorded. Pope Gregory IV made All Saints' Day an authorized holiday in 835 CE. It is speculated that the chosen date for the event, November 1, may have been an attempt to supplant the pagan Festival of the Dead (also known as Samhain or the feast of Saman, lord of death).

All Saints' Day is not to be confused with All Souls' Day, which was first instituted at the monastery in Cluny in 993 CE and quickly spread among Christians.

OCTOBER 12, 2021 COUNCIL MEETING

(Please note that minutes are not approved until voted on by the council at the next meeting.)



The Church Council met on October 12, 2021, at 7:00 PM. Present were: Matt Gardner, Mac Beaudry, Donna Sommer, Pastor Mann, Melanie Beckman, Kathy Keller, Jeff Schmidt, and Janet Hanson. Absent were Stacy Boeshans and Lee Kugler. Also present was Jeannette Rost.

The meeting was called to order.

Schmidt/Beckman to approve the agenda. Carried.

Pastor led with devotions about to bless, praise, blessed and blessing. What is here is good (blessed). To bless, or praise describes the act of showing gratitude to God or receiving favor from God. He also talked about noise. What voices or who are we listening to?

Beckman/Sommer to approve the minutes from September 9, 2021. Carried.

Sommer gave the treasurer's report. The following balances are on hand: CD's: \$150,000.00; Checking: \$88,794.37; Building: \$48,095.91; Cemetery: \$617.40; Interest: \$5,372.98; Music: \$236.74; Parking Lot: \$1,470.00; Worship: \$2,783.44; Morgan Stanley: \$11,992.40. Total Assets: \$309,363.24. Keller/Schmidt to approve the report for future audit and to pay all non-budgeted bills. Carried.

Pastors Report: Pastor presided over two baptisms, one wedding and one funeral this past month. He continues meeting with members in person, phone and with home communion. All Saints Sunday is November 7. Pastor would like to include Rose and Chime at that service. Names will be read and one family member will bring a rose and put it in a vase while a chime is played. There will be Thanksgiving Eve service on Wed. Nov. 24 at 7:00 with communion.

Review of the constitution: Sommer went over the treasurer's duties. The treasurer is part of the Exec. Committee with the President, Vice President, Secretary and Pastor. The treasurer cannot serve more than two terms consecutively. The treasurer is in charge of the Audit committee but the Council elects a new person each year for a three year term.

Committee reports:

Stewardship: Will be meeting with the Exec committee to review the budget.

Worship: We changed communion to two stations instead of one. For congregation feedback, people like the usage of the screen and requested more special music.

Education: Boeshans was gone but sent in a report. The numbers for Sunday school are down; not sure why. The Christmas program is set for Dec. 19, looking at Advent presentations, First Lutheran is working with the Methodist church to have a trunk or treat.

Evangelism: Beckman reported the Shoe Boxes will be out for members to take and fill.

Property: Kugler was absent so he had no report. Pastor reported that the windows for the Parsonage have just been installed. Kugler has been working on other projects.

Mutual Ministry Committee: Beaudry is still looking for one more member. They have not met yet.

Technology committee: Looking at the possibility of having a Tech coordinator (staff member) for approximately 20 hours a month. They will keep discussing it and bring their ideas to the council.

Old Business:

We have \$864.47 in Thrivent Choice Dollars. Rost reported she will be ordering more Baptism medallions with this money. Beaudry/Beckman to use up to \$300.00 from these Thrivent Choice Dollars to pay for mailing Shoe boxes. Carried.

The endowment committee has met and will come to the council with a proposal in December. They have a survey out in the newsletter and in the back of the church for members to fill out their preferences and ideas.

They are still working on a wireless internet site survey.

The Council had a brief update on the Conflict Resolution. Beaudry/Schmidt to reimburse Pastor Jane Ekholm \$443.36 for hotel and mileage to come out of the Continuing Education budget. Carried.

New Business:

Sommer/Beaudry to give \$350.00 for costs associated with the Trunk or Treat. This will come out of the \$5,000.00 donation given to First Lutheran to

use for the Youth. Carried.

Last Sunday was Honey Sunday. Beckman/Schmidt to send the money received (\$389.00) to The Boys and Girls Ranch for their tuition assistance program. Carried.

Warren's Locks and Keys were out and gave two quotes for the Door lock system. Beaudry/Schmidt to approve the purchase of an auto lock system, estimate #20092, for a cost of \$6,896.00 from Warren's Lock and Keys. Carried.

There were no transfers in or out.

The next meeting is scheduled for December 7, 2021 at 7:00 pm. There will be no meeting scheduled in November. The budget meeting is rescheduled for October 28, 2021 at 7:00 pm.

Beaudry/Schmidt to adjourn. Carried.

We ended with the Lord's Prayer.

LCMC Just Held Its 21st Annual Gathering & Convention

Here's Everything You Need to Know

445 people attended Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ's 21st Annual Gathering & Convention, held October 3-6, 2021 at Upper Arlington Lutheran Church in Hilliard, OH.

The total number of in-person attendees included 280 voting delegates, 76 members, all eight board of trustees members, and five members of the LCMC staff.

"Speak It, Live It, Share It" was the theme for the event, which focused on exploring some practical ways in which the Gospel can be spoken, lived, and shared in one's everyday life.

Programming began on Sunday evening with an opening worship service preached by Steve Turnbull, the senior pastor of Upper Arlington Lutheran Church, along with Katie Borden serving as this year's worship leader.

Morning Bible study was led by Erik Anderson, the discipleship pastor at New Life Lutheran Church.

Pastors Jeremey King of Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church and Nathan Hoff of Trinity Lutheran Church keynoted the event on Monday morning.

Mike Bradley presented his service coordinator's report on Monday afternoon, which was followed by the first of three breakout sessions.

As programming wrapped up for the evening, attendees had the opportunity to attend a fellowship dinner or get connected with one the various districts and fellowships in LCMC.

Tuesday morning's programming featured keynote speaker Jenn Alexander, the worship and speaking pastor at Hosanna Church, followed by a panel discussion on ministry featuring LCMC Coordinator for Districts and Fellowships Julie Smith, Upper Arlington Lutheran Church's Director of Children's Ministry Andrea Taphorn, and Trinity Lutheran Church Pastor Nathan Hoff.

Perry Fruhling, the LCMC coordinator for pastoral ministry, recognized and prayed for the pastors, seminarians, and congregations in LCMC on Tuesday afternoon.

During the business session, Jeremey King (Area 1), Jonathan Anderson (Area 2), Susan Gunderson (Area 4), Jason Eliot (Area 7), and Cindy Glessner (At Large) were elected to serve on the LCMC Board of Trustees.

LCMC ANNUAL GATHERING REPORTS 2021

It has been difficult to think of just one takeaway from the whole LCMC conference that occurred on October 3-6 in Ohio. The theme this year was Speak It, Live It, Share It. The conference was filled with so many blessings that consisted of times of worship, Bible study, four keynote speakers, 3 breakout sessions where we could learn about specific topics or hear more from guest speakers and meet many vendors – from church supplies and book vendors to mission organizations who do amazing work for Christ in the U.S. and all over the globe.

One of the keynote addresses that still rings true to me was given by Pastor Nathan Hoff. He centered his talk on a word, *Eulegeo*, which is the Greek word that means to bless & praise and describes the act of showing gratitude to God or receiving favor from God. Together we traveled through all of Scripture, starting in the beginning of the Bible in the book of Genesis. During creation, God spoke and he declared His creation good. Then in Genesis 1:22 “²²And God *blessed* them, saying, “Be fruitful and multiply and fill the waters in the seas, and let birds multiply on the earth.” This “blessed” uses the Hebrew word (BRK- spoken BARACK) that has the same meaning of blessing as our Greek word.

A few verses later, after the creation of man and woman in His image, what does God do again? “And God *blessed* them. And God said to them, ‘Be fruitful and multiply and fill the earth and subdue it, and have dominion over the fish of the sea and over the birds of the heavens and over every living thing that moves on the earth’” (Genesis 1:28).

His first point he begun with a question. How is yours stolen? Is your blessing something that you take with you or has it been taken from you in these last months. The Enemy knows our weaknesses. It is the thief in the night who steals our peace. A theme through many of the presentations that came out was that for many, in the last 18

months many have had their *Eulegeos* stolen. We have felt this during the time of isolation, constant change and all that happened during the COVID pandemic in life and especially in churches all around the U.S.. He next moved on to the New Testament to where he focused on how the *Eulegeos* (*blessing*) is restored.

This next part he focused on how we need to be watchful of what voices we are listening to...what is coming into our ears. Who are we listening to? We hear in Ephesians 1:3, “³*Blessed* be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has *blessed* us in Christ with every spiritual *blessing* in the heavenly places.” In case you missed it, we hear from the Apostle Paul this word “Blessed” in three forms (adjective, noun and verb). This *Eulegeos* (*blessing*) must go as far as the curse is found. It is the difference in our thoughts, words and deeds, where we have to consider whether we are victims or are blessed ones (remember Genesis?). We need to focus on the blessing because this is found in that we are forgiven. Our Doxology (Praise God from Whom all blessings flow...) is the language of *blessing*. The Aaronic *blessing* (The Lord Bless you and keep you...). There is so much more, but I will let you sit on edge of your seats to hear it from Pastor Nathan yourself.

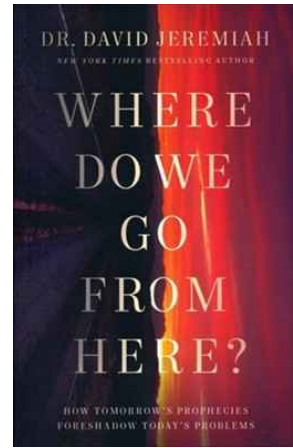

Today's headlines shout of modern plagues, social tensions, economic crises, and rampant depression. Many are asking, *what day is it on God's prophetic calendar?* Trusted Bible teacher and pastor Dr. David Jeremiah opens up the Word of God to reveal what it has to say about the days in which we are living.

In this ten-lesson study guide, which accompanies the book of the same name, Dr. Jeremiah shares how prophecies and wisdom from centuries ago still speak the truth today and point the way forward to tomorrow. Whether one is new to biblical prophecy or a longtime student of the Bible, this timely message will encourage and recalibrate us to the mission of God in our daily lives.

As Dr. Jeremiah explains, "The idea for this book began a few years ago in an interview I did with Matt Crouch for my book *Is This the End?* At the end of the interview, Matt asked, 'So where's the hope?' I've never forgotten that question, and since then I have determined that all my prophetic writing should be infused with hope. The first section will be 'Where Are We?' Here we will find modern stories and show the reader where we are in this cultural moment. The second section is 'What Does It Mean?' In this section, we will focus on the exposition of Scripture and how the events we describe fit with prophecy. Finally, the last section will be the hope section I talked about above—'Where do we go from here?' Here we want to give application and practical ways for living with hope and courage."

As part of the LCMC conference, we were able to participate in a morning Bible study that was led by Pastor Erik Anderson. One of the topics was on the Greek word peripateo. I am not a pastor, and definitely not a Greek student, so as he repetitively said the word emphasizing peri-pa-te-o it sounded like peri-potato. Potato just kind of got stuck in my head. The importance of this word is the meaning behind it. Pastor Anderson went on to explain that peripateo is used to describe what an army does when it conquers a land. It does not just mean walk, but also means to surround and inhabit a land. They become a part of the land that they have conquered.

This can be compared to what happens when Christ dwells in us through the Holy Spirit, He "peripateo's" us. He surrounds, encompasses, and inhabits us. This is half of the relationship though; we are called to do the same thing in reverse. We are called to surround, encompass, and inhabit Christ as well. We can meditate on His words by reading scripture, seek Him through prayer, and praise Him with songs and thanksgiving. Another way to look at this can be found in scripture- John 15:4 "Abide in me, and I in you". Whether you remember to peripateo, abide, or potato... remember to walk with Christ and that He walks with and within you each and every day.

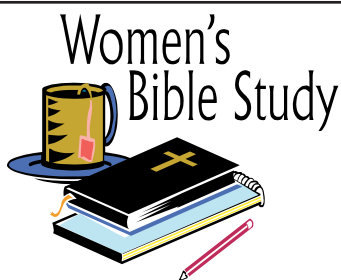

THE JOURNEY BEGINS AT ADVENT

When Advent begins on November 28 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year.

Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."
