OCTOBER 13, 2022 COUNCIL MEETING



(Please note that minutes are not approved until voted on by the council at the next meeting.)

The Church Council met on October 13, 2022, at 6:30 PM. Present were: Matt Gardner, Aaron Solomonson, Mac Beaudry, Pastor Mann, Jeff Schmidt, Melanie Beckman, and Janet Hanson. Absent were Sarah Kadrmas and Julie Bentz. Also present was Jeannette Rost.

The meeting was called to order and the agenda was approved.

Pastor led with devotions on vision of missiondetermining our destination as presented by Rev. Mark Vander Tuig.

Beaudry/Beckman to approve the minutes from September 15, 2022. Carried.

Solomonson gave the treasurer's report. The following balances are on hand: CD's: \$150,000.00; Checking: \$92,104.23; Building: \$36,314.33; Cemetery: \$617.40; Interest: \$8,768.62; Music: \$1,511.74; Parking Lot: \$820.00; Worship: \$2,703.44; Ameriprise Financial: \$39,995.60; Morgan Stanley: \$11,992.40. Total Assets: \$344,827.76. Schmidt/ Pastor Mann to approve the report for future audit and to pay all non-budgeted bills. Carried.

Pastors Report: Pastor presided over two funeral/committal/graveside services. He has met with staff and members. There is a NALC round table meeting on Oct. 19. There will be a new member's class on Oct. 23 and a new member Sunday in Nov. We will have a Faith Comes by Hearing basket in the Narthex from Oct. 30-Nov. 20 if anyone is interested in giving. Pastor is planning a Lutheran theology class starting in November. He and Stephanie and Mac and Judy Beaudry attended the LCMC conference. All Saints Sunday will be Nov. 6 with a Rose and Chime. Thanksgiving Eve service is planned for Nov. 23 at 7 pm, 3 days of prayer will be held on Jan. 3-5 with a prayer service on Jan. 5 at 7 pm.

Committee reports:

Education: Kadrmas was absent, but Rost gave her report that they continue to be short teachers/music teacher.

Property: Gardner reported that Weber Electric will come to work on the parsonage/lights upstairs on a rainy day. He has gotten a bid for the window in the Women's bathroom, and there are two windows downstairs that have rock chips and they are under warranty that will be fixed this fall, some work needs to be done on the boiler.

Technology: Pastor reported they are working on the TV in the fireside room. They are looking long term on the sound system.

Old Business:

We have \$461.92 in Thrivent Choice Dollars. We will use this money if we need to cover the shipping of the Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes. Beckman will work on this.

The council looked at the FLC policy for Church use. Beckman/Schmidt to approve the policy promoting use of the Church. Carried.

Gardner went over the Endowment fund policy.

They are waiting for the electrical and plumbing to be done with the parsonage basement bathroom. After that, the vanity can be put in.

Gardner got quotes for the office air conditioners. The consensus of the board was to do all three offices at one time for the price of \$9,500.00 from HA Thompson & Sons.

The nominating committee will be meting the end of Oct. to discuss the positions that will be open. Anyone who is interested in being on Council is asked to talk to Kris Schmidt.

New Business:

Beaudry/Schmidt to approve the Affirmation of Faith for Kole Albers, Maeleigh Baumann, Mya Nelson, and Ryleigh Schmidt. Carried. Confirmation will be on Oct. 30.

A few budget considerations were discussed. The Women of the Church would like to see the goodies on Sunday after Church become a budgeted item. The Women also asked for replacement of stoves in the Kitchen. Some aren't working right. The budget committee will look into these. If anyone else has other budget concerns, they should talk to Gardner about it.

There were no transfers in.

Beckman/Beaudry to approve the transfer out of Melanie Biesterfeld and children Madisyn and Colt to Sunne Lutheran Church and Amanda Goulet to Zion Lutheran Church of Warroad, MN. Carried.

The next meeting will be on November 10 at 6:30 PM, with a budget committee meeting at 5:00 PM.

Schmidt/Beaudry to adjourn. Carried.

We ended with the Lord's Prayer.

ALL SAINTS' SUNDAY



According to some sources, the idea for All Saints' Day goes back to the fourth century when the Greek Christians kept a festival on the first Sunday after Pentecost (in late May or early June) in honor of all martyrs and saints. Other sources say that a commemoration of "All Martyrs" began to be celebrated as early as 270 CE but no specific month or date is recorded. Pope Gregory IV made All Saints' Day an authorized holiday in 835 CE. It is speculated that the chosen date for the event, November 1, may have been an attempt to supplant the pagan Festival of the Dead (also known as Samhain or the feast of Saman, lord of death).

All Saints' Day is not to be confused with All Souls' Day, which was first instituted at the monastery in Cluny in 993 CE and quickly spread among Christians.

22nd ANNUAL LCMC ANNUAL GATHERING REPORTS OCTOBER 2-5, 2022

LCMC Conference 2022 Pastor Chuck

On October 2, 2022 the 22nd annual LCMC conference was held at Hosanna Church in Lakeville, Minnesota. Attending this year, was Mac & Judy Beaudry, and Steph and myself. The theme this year was focused on Discipleship, following Christ in a complicated world. Every time I attend an LCMC conference I am astounded by the impact of these few days on myself as well as everyone who attends. There were many takeaways and great break-out sessions, which you will be able to read about in the other articles related to the conference. There is an importance in LCMC DNA related to coming together with other Lutherans and having fellowship, worship and discussion every year. There were many morsels of thought about discipleship as it relates to the church and even on the family and a personal level. Just a few of the highlights from the conference.

The first morsel that we heard in the opening bible study was that Discipleship is not a chore, or something that we have to do to guarantee our salvation. The purpose of the church is to love as Jesus loved. In the Gospels, Jesus described that we are to love God and love people. The key point is that discipleship is gospel to our lives, good news that it brings us joy. There is joy in following Jesus.

There were three keynotes messages, by pastors Ebassa Berhanu, Steve Turnbull, and Graeme Sellers. There could be so much to highlight for all these keynotes. Picking one keynote, Pastor Turnbull's keynote regarding our discipleship

perspectives in the church was thought provoking. Steve described many observations where the church can have healthy conversations about what this means to us. He artfully described discipleship as a dilemma, but by the end shows how it becomes a delightful discipleship dilemma. His key points were that the kingdom comes by the power of the king, the king teaches and calls for a response, and the kingdom is at hand. It is then implied that it is not really a dilemma at all, but comes in the Good News message of Jesus Christ. We are able to see as a community the hope and power of God that is found in the Kingdom and comes by the power of the King. We need discipleship and especially our neighbors do too.

A Personal View of Discipleship

Throughout the recent LCMC conference we were encouraged to think about the word "discipleship" and what that means to us. At different times we were asked the question, "What is a disciple?" Among the many answers were: a follower, student, and teacher. In a breakout session led by Dave Wollan, he proposed that in order to better understand discipleship we first need to understand:

- 1. Who we are
- 2. Who Christ is
- 3. What Christ has done
- 4. Who we are because of what Christ has done

First, we are sinners. This started in the garden of Eden with "the fall" which one author stated could better be described as "the uprising". This was the temptation of man to become like God. Because we are all sinners, we are all judged through the law (Romans 3:19-20).

Second, Christ is sinless.

Third, Christ justified all through his sacrifice for us, not through anything we have done (Galatians 4:4-5). That act performed millennia ago comes to us today and it sounds like absolution (as we hear our sins are forgiven), tastes like bread and wine (as we partake in Holy Communion), and feels like water (through the gift of Baptism).

Fourth, we are now a new creation in Christ. "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come." (2 Corinthians 5:17) *You* are not *You* anymore. Your old self has been crucified and in its place is Christ. Christ now **dwells in** you. Christ **shines through** you. You are a **new creation.**

What does this mean for discipleship? What does this new creation need to hear? Is this smooth sailing from here? Not quite... The battle wages on. In this life we will still struggle with our sinful nature because we are human, we are not Christ. It is the struggle of "saint and sinner", or as Luther talked about the "Old Adam" and the "New Adam". This means that personal discipleship then follows what Christ said in Matthew 16:24-26: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever would save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit a man if he gains the whole world and forfeits his soul? Or what shall a man give in return for his soul?"

This viewpoint of discipleship is a personal one. It looks at our relationship with Christ and desire to know Him and draw close to Him. It also calls for the continuous process of repentance and absolution. It acknowledges that we are imperfect, Christ is perfect, and through His sacrifice alone we receive justification.

We want to thank First Lutheran for the opportunity to attend.



Joining Jesus as a Family

Greg Finke was the breakout speaker for Joining Jesus as a family. He wrote this book and a couple of others that are definitely worthwhile reads. I'd like to touch on some of what he covered in his breakout session, if you have questions or would like to hear more, please let me know!

How many hours do you think an average, active, and involved family participates in church activities? The answer is 40 hours a year of church time. This is in comparison to 3000 hours of productive time spent with their family outside of church per year.



There are a couple of important things to take away from this. The first takeaway is for the church family. Everyone in the congregation has a role in raising children and showing them faith, even if they are not yours. Discipling children is not as much about *information* as it is about *relationship building* and *lifestyle example*. They are watching and learning as they grow. It is how their minds work. We have 1% to work with (and that is with the most active families), so it is important to show Christ's love to the kiddos, parents, and families as they come to the church. Finke said "God's love is your superpower, but it only works if you **use** it!" God's love is an **action**. Reach out and show it however you can, maybe it

will just be a word of welcome, or maybe it will be a smile of encouragement if a kiddo is cranky and crying during a service, or maybe it will be a seat at your table during coffee hour and an invitation into a conversation to help them feel welcome as they wait for their kids in Sunday School.

Second is for families. 99% of the active time your kiddos get is with you. We get 1% of the time or less, and we will support you however we can. We are here to help however possible, but the 99% is what will outshine the 1%. In the long run, it matters what happens in that 99%. What these kids are seeing and hearing matters. Challenge them to act out what they are learning in church. Have conversations about your faith. How your faith became real for you. It doesn't have to be super-technical, you don't have to throw out twenty verses. Be real with them. Tell them how your faith makes you feel. How does Christ make you feel. (This doesn't just have to be families with kids, I would encourage all families/members to have these conversations with each other). Encourage your children to use their "superpower" of Christ's love and share stories of how they were able to do this at the end of the day. Most kids are in school, and this provides ample opportunity for acts of kindness towards others. These can be teaching moments, especially if they feel someone may not have "deserved" the kindness or love. Another good teaching opportunity is to use opportunities that your family is already doing like activities. Christ didn't sit in a classroom with the disciples, but they were on the move, walking through the countryside with on-the-job training. Some of their best learning they did in a boat during a storm.

This is an exciting journey as we grow together as a church family in our faith, and as our families grow in their faith as well. We lift your families, you as parents, your children, and our congregation in our prayers as you support each other in this important ministry. May the Lord bless you and keep you. Amen.

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CHAPTER TWO

GIVING AS AN ACT OF WORSHIP

THE REV. DR. EUGENE GRIMM

hat is worship? Many books have been written about it, so how can we hope to cover it adequately here? A simple definition of worship could be "the act of adoring God." Going beyond a definition, descriptions of worship could go on and on. We can label it liturgical, contemporary, and so on, but form is not the essence of worship. If one form helps you to express your adoration for God better than another, then that style of worship is right for you. There is no right or wrong way to adore God.

Maybe a good question to ask is, "When we leave worship, do we feel uplifted? Do we feel like we've been in the presence of the Lord?" I once had a member named Ed leave church one Sunday with a scowl on his face. He confronted me, saying, "Preacher, I've got a bone to pick with you. You haven't stepped on my toes in six weeks." Ed's idea of worship was to leave the service feeling guilty. Isn't that sad?

Wouldn't it be wonderful if he left worship

with a sense of exultation at having been in the presence of our Holy God? Wouldn't it be great for him to feel a sense of forgiveness? Wouldn't it be great for him to leave thinking, "I adore God more than ever and am so grateful for the salvation our Lord has brought to us"?

Have you ever stopped to look at what our Lutheran liturgy does? We often begin our worship with a brief order of confession and forgiveness. Then we may progress to singing a hymn of praise. All this is to draw us closer to our Lord and prepare our hearts for what's next — the opportunity to receive his Word. Indeed, what we may think of as worship preliminaries — these are all about preparing our hearts to receive and take heart in the reading of God's Word. Following the reading may come the preaching of the Word. After being touched by the preaching of God's Word, in whatever form it takes, and in response to all that's gone before, we make confession of our faith in the words of a creed.

MALACHI 3:10

Bring the full tithe into the storehouse, that there may be food in my house. And thereby put me to the test, says the Lord of hosts, if I will not open the windows of heaven for you and pour down for you a blessing until there is no more need.

MARK 12:42-44

And a poor widow came and put in two small copper coins, which make a penny. And he called his disciples to him and said to them, "Truly, I say to you, this poor widow has put in more than all those who are contributing to the offering box. For they all contributed out of their abundance, but she out of her poverty has put in everything she had, all she had to live on."

1 CORINTHIANS 16:1-2 (RSV)

Now concerning the contribution for the saints: as I directed the churches of Galatia, so you also are to do. On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I come.

To this point, the liturgy has been confessing and hearing from God. Following the creed is our first really overt act: the offering. Giving is our act of worship that responds to all that has gone before it. Then come the prayers and, finally, the Holy Sacrament.

Whether your worship follows this more traditional style or is a more contemporary approach, the fluidity of the service is all about preparing our hearts and hearing God's voice. Giving in worship is an act acknowledging all that God is doing in our hearts and lives. Giving is always a love response — not to the sermon, but to the Gospel. We give because we love Jesus. We give generously and sacrificially because we want to show our love (agape) for our Lord.

Dr. Mark Allan Powell, in his 2006 book *Giving to God*, addresses giving as an act of worship in his first chapter. He notes that in the Old Testament, people brought their sacrificial offerings to the altar and laid them there. He writes: "The offering is an act of worship, an instance in which we are invited to give up something that we value — our money — as a sacrifice to God. In many ways it is the high point of the liturgy. We come to church to worship God and at no other point in the service are we provided with so pure an opportunity for worship as this" (p. 11).

He continues: "On a simple, practical level, I find it easier to sing hymns and not really mean them than it is to part with my money and not really mean it" (p. 12).

St. Paul wrote in 1 Corinthians 16:2, "On the first day of every week, each of you is to put something aside and store it up, as he may prosper, so that contributions need not be made when I

come." In this single verse we can glean that:

- Giving is an act of worship Sunday worship had already begun.
- Giving is systematic we give whenever we worship.
- Giving is proportionate to income we give as we have prospered.
- Giving is planned in advance so contributions need not be made at the last minute.

God wants all of us — our whole being. God wants our hearts. We give not because our church needs the money but because giving is an intrinsic need. Giving expresses, or demonstrates, our love for God. It acknowledges that we love Jesus: "I need to give." We all need to give. It's part and parcel of Whose we are.

We give generously and sacrificially not because God needs it or even because the church needs it, but because we want to show our love for Him. I once heard about a pastor in Philadelphia that noted the offerings had fallen short of the congregation's needs. On receiving the offering plates from the ushers, he rather audaciously turned, faced the altar and prayed, "Well, God, this is what we think of you." What a wake-up call!

Worship giving, first-fruit giving, is not designated. You don't control it. You don't direct it. You don't tell God what to do with it. You give. The early Hebrews put their sacrificial gifts on the altar, and in some cases, set them on fire. They would never have presumed to tell God what to do with the gifts they gave.

Worship giving is both duty (obedience and obligation) and delight (joy). Joyful giving of our time, talents and treasure to God is then an expression of our love for our Lord.

ENGAGE

- 1. How have you experienced giving as an act of worship? Do you think of your offering as a "love offering"?
- 2. How have you experienced giving as an expression of love in your own life as either the giver or the receiver of gifts?
- 3. What is the purpose of worship for you? Is the concept of "adoring" God new to you? What other emotions do you feel?
- 4. Do you feel obligated to give as a duty? To whom do you feel your giving is a duty? To your church? To God?
- 5. When is it appropriate to designate one's gift, and when is it inappropriate? Discuss for a few moments.

Holy Lord God, help us to grow in both our sense of duty and of delight as we make our offerings. Help us realize that, while there are many motives for giving, our primary motive must be a love response. Even as the disciples asked Jesus to teach them to pray, so now we ask you to teach us to give. Grant us a new lesson on giving every week as we make our offering to you. We ask this, O God, through our Savior and Lord, Jesus the Christ. Amen.

There you are sitting in worship or Bible study. Your child, or toddler, is restless. Perhaps they're even a little rowdy. You try to silence them, and nothing. You try to pacify them with food or toys, and nothing. Eventually, you resort to the last thing you wanted to do: you pick them up, and before a watching audience, you make the march out of the auditorium. All the while, you're feeling a little embarrassed. Maybe you're a little frustrated too. You might even think to yourself, "There's no point in coming to church. I get nothing out of it because I have to constantly care for my child."

I want you — you mothers and/or fathers — to know just how encouraging you are to so many! The little elderly woman who often feels alone beams with a smile at the sight of you wrestling with your little one. She's been there before. She knows how hard it can be, but she smiles because to hear that brings back precious memories. To see young parents and their small children brighten her day, and she may have just received bad news this week about her health, but seeing the vitality of young ones removes — if but for a moment — her fears.

The older man who always seems to be grouchy notices you too. He's always talking about how children in this day have no respect or sense of good. But, he sees you — a young family — in church, and you don't miss any gathering. Like clockwork, he can depend on the sight of you and your young family. You give him hope that maybe the church isn't doomed after all, because there are still young parents who love God enough to bring their restless children to worship.

The family who's unable to have children notice you too. They'd love to be in your shoes, but for whatever reasons, they are unable to bear children. They've thought about adopting, but they're not sure if that's what they want to do or if they will keep on trying to have children of their own. They'd love to talk to you for a little while about the joys of your children. They need you!

Then there's everybody else. Yes, some people will honestly become frustrated by noisy children in church. They have this WARPED idea and notion that reverence includes absolute silence. IT DOESN'T!!

When parents brought their children to Jesus, the disciples rebuked them (Matthew 19:13-15), but Jesus rebuked His disciples. He said, "Let the little children come to me and do not hinder them, for to such belongs the kingdom of heaven." The term translated "children" in Matthew and Mark is paidon. The root of the word "pedagogue" is from this word. It defined children of either an infant state, or more particularly, it was with reference to those who were half-grown and could be either males or females.

When Luke wrote his account of this narrative, he used the word brephos; which means "infants." Luke wasn't contradicting Matthew and Mark's account, because Luke wrote that they brought the infants "also" (Luke 18:15-17). They would have squirmed, maybe even cried. This was likely why the disciples rebuked the parents; as well as that they might have thought that the children were too young to understand the blessing Christ pronounced over them.

Bring your children to church. IF YOU DON'T HEAR CRYING, THE CHURCH IS DYING!! As hard as it might be for you as a parent, keep on doing what you're doing!! I love you and your crying children! You are an encouragement, and you're starting off your children's lives as you should!




