(Welcome to this Good Friday Service. Tonight we celebrate the Tenebrae Service: The word "Tenebrae" is from Latin meaning darkness. Darkness reminds us of the terrible reality of our sin, which caused our Savior to die for us. This is a service of confession, prayer, and acknowledgment of God's great work of forgiveness, accomplished on a hill called Calvary.)

WORDS OF WELCOME

OPENING PRAYER:

Dearest Lord, on this night of darkness prepare our hearts for Your light. Let us see the gravity of our sin, but also let us see our Savior. May we be moved to sorrow for our many offenses against you, and from our sorrow, may we see our Savior's forgiving love. Let the light of Your love shine in the darkness that we may go away from this night with solemn appreciation of Christ's great sacrifice, and we might also be moved to live willingly and sacrificially for Him. In Jesus' name. Amen.

INVOCATION AND OPENING SENTENCES:

- P: In the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.
- C: Amen.
- P: Jesus demonstrates the Father's love to us.
- C: He loved us from eternity and will love us into eternity.
- P: He knew that He was born into this world to die;
- C: And He willingly laid down His life for the sheep He loved.
- P: As He hung upon the cross He was forsaken.
- C: Jesus, who knew no sin, became sin for us, so that we might become the righteousness of God.

CONFESSION OF SINS:

- All: Have mercy on me, O God, according to Your unfailing love; according to Your great compassion blot out my transgressions. Wash away all my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin. For I know my transgressions, and my sin is always before me. Against You, You only, have I sinned and done what is evil in Your sight.
- P: I have lived as if God did not matter and as if I mattered most.
- C: My Lord's name I have not honored as I should; my worship and prayers have faltered.
- P: I have not let His love have its way with me, and so my love for others has failed.

C: There are those whom I have hurt, and those whom I failed to help.

P: My thoughts and desires have been soiled with sin.

All: We are heartily sorry for these and for our many other offenses. For the sake of the bitter sufferings and death of Your Son, Jesus Christ, be merciful to me, a poor sinful being.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF GOD'S FORGIVENESS:

P: Jesus endured the cruelty of this world and a cross that we might know the kindness of God. He bore the lashes, endured harsh punishment that we might be gently treated. Because of Him, God, in love, and mercy, has forgiven our sin. In Jesus' name, your sins are forgiven this day. Amen.

SCRIPTURE READINGS:

Isaiah 53:1-6

Who has believed our message and to whom has the arm of the LORD been revealed? ² He grew up before him like a tender shoot, and like a root out of dry ground. He had no beauty or majesty to attract us to him, nothing in his appearance that we should desire him. ³ He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. Like one from whom men hide their faces he was despised, and we esteemed him not. ⁴ Surely he took up our infirmities and carried our sorrows, yet we considered him stricken by God, smitten by him, and afflicted. ⁵ But he was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. ⁶ We all, like sheep, have gone astray, each of us has turned to his own way; and the LORD has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

Hebrews 4:14-16, 5:7-9 Read By All

¹⁴ Therefore, since we have a great high priest who has gone through the heavens, Jesus the Son of God, let us hold firmly to the faith we profess. ¹⁵ For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who has been tempted in every way, just as we are—yet was without sin. ¹⁶ Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need.

⁷ During the days of Jesus' life on earth, he offered up prayers and petitions with loud cries and tears to the one who could save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. ⁸ Although he was a son, he learned obedience from what he suffered ⁹ and, once made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him.

- C: Grant us a faith that bears testimony to our friends and community that this salvation is also available to them.
- P: So fill us with Your Holy Spirit that our lives will be a constant witness to our faith in the crucified Christ.
- C: This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. Amen.

Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Listening for the Promise

WEEKLY DEVOTIONAL

Good Friday - March 29, 2024

"And being made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation to all who obey him."

- Hebrews 4:9 -

Holy week is a good time to ask the deep questions of our faith. Who is Jesus? What did He do? What does this mean for my life? These questions might not offer any new insights, but they help us to focus on Jesus Christ at a time when the world is watching. It helps us witness to this truth of Christian faith: we can't get to the Resurrection without the Crucifixion. Perhaps this seems obvious, but most people would rather believe in the triumph of Christ and ignore the suffering. Even many Christians would rather jump from Palm Sunday to Easter.

It is easy to believe in the Resurrection. God is all-powerful; God gives life and it is no surprise that He can raise someone from the dead. We don't expect any less from the Lord God Almighty. The proclamation of Easter brings joy and peace. Even those who do not believe in Jesus enjoy the celebration of Easter and its focus on life, renewal, and joy.

It is a lot harder to believe in Good Friday. God is all-powerful, why would His Son, our Lord Jesus, have to suffer such incredible pain and humiliation? Why did He have to die? How can any of this be good? Even if we can give the right theological answers to the questions of Good Friday, we still wonder in our hearts why it had to be this way. The world rejects the cross as foolishness; it is not surprising because even believers have a hard time understanding it.

We cannot reject the events of Good Friday, however. The crowds came looking for Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane with Judas as their guide. He betrayed Jesus with a kiss; the soldiers arrested Him. Jesus was tried, sent back and forth between the Romans and Jews; no one wanted to be responsible for a death they were convinced was necessary. He was humiliated and beaten. The people chose to set a murderous thief free rather than the King of Creation. His disciples fled, Peter denied Him. It might seem like God lost control, but it was there that we see truly see His power. Jesus' way of being in the world caused him to be there; he was too good, too perfect for a society of sinners. We destroyed the Son of God on that horrible day. But that's not the end of the story. . .
